Tremé, is America's oldest African American neighborhood, but was also the site of significant economic, cultural, political, social, and legal events that have shaped the course of events in Black America for the past two centuries. The area received its namesake from Claude Tremé, a model hat maker and real estate developer who migrated from Saugivny in Burgundy, France, and settled in New Orleans in 1783. In later years, free persons of color and eventually those African slaves who obtained, bought, or bargained for their freedom were able to acquire and own property in Tremé. There are hundreds of examples of 18th and early 19th century ownership of large and small land greas in Faubourg Tremé by free persons of color. Today, New Orleans' Tremé neighborhood is the locale for visitors and natives alike to Celebrate the achievements of African Americans. Various celebrations like second-line parades and jazz funerals are only a few of the lively ways Tremé honors its heritage.

Hurricane Katrina

Hurricane Katrina, one of the worst natural disasters in US history, struck the Gulf Coast of the United States the morning of August 29, 2005 as a Category 5 rating on the Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Scale. It became a large and extremely powerful hurricane that caused enormous destruction and significant loss of life. It is the costliest hurricane to ever hit the United States, surpassing the record previously held by Hurricane Andrew from 1992. In addition, Katrina is one of the five deadliest hurricanes to ever strike the United States. In all, Hurricane Katrina was responsible for 1,833 fatalities and approximately \$108 billion in damage (un-adjusted 2005 dollars).

When the storm made landfall, it had a Category 3 rating -it brought sustained winds of 100-140 miles per hour-and stretched some 400 miles across. The storm itself did a great deal of damage, but its aftermath was catastrophic. Levee breaches led to massive flooding, and many people charged that the federal government was slow to meet the needs of the people affected by the storm. Hundreds of thousands of people in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama were displaced from their homes. The devastating affects of Hurricane Katrina still echo and linger throughout segments of New Orleans and across the United States, in the people whose lives were forever changed.

Rebirth Brass Band is a Grammy award winning group that has brought the sound of New Orleans and second line

Second lining has been called "the quintessential New Orleans art form – a jazz funeral without a body." Historically, the African-American community began second lines as neighborhood celebrations. The neighborhood organizations offered social aid to freed slaves, such as loans and insurance, and used the second-lines as a form of advertising. Second lines were also used to honor members who died in their community, which launched the idea of second lines at funerals. Often, Mardi Gras Indians were and still are included in the procession.

Whether a jazz funeral, wedding or other celebration, second line music and dance is all about rhythm, footwork, expression and celebration. For New Orleanians, it is a way of life...representing the pain and suffering, joy, celebration and a connection to the roots...taking it to the streets with a beautiful expression of humanity.
